

This information sheet is the second in a series by the Public Health Wales central alcohol team. It is designed to highlight a number of key online resources and to outline the position that we are taking in relation to alcohol education websites.

I want to find some information about alcohol and share it with my local partners. There's plenty of information on the internet isn't there?

Yes there is but it is important that it is accurate, useful and comes from credible sources. Public Health Wales has developed partnerships with certain groups and service providers whose websites are built from the evidence base and aim to prevent the harm caused by alcohol and promote sensible drinking.

But Public Health Wales have their own alcohol web pages?

Yes, we do, the link is below.

What information will I find there?

The aim of the Public Health Wales alcohol page is very specific. It is to provide health professionals with the statistics and facts they need about alcohol, as well as links to key documents such as the Cochrane Review and the very latest NICE guidance. The webpage also provides information about alcohol brief interventions. However, there are no public facing messages.

That's all well and good for health professionals, but where should the general public be directed?

There are many websites available.

Alcohol Concern Cymru has a comprehensive website giving access to their publications, campaigns and training programmes. The important element of this website is that it gives a Welsh perspective on the issue of alcohol and is available as a bi-lingual site.

That looks like it covers all of the policy issues and the harm caused by alcohol but where do I direct someone who is looking for some straight forward advice about cutting down?

The Drink Wise Wales website is the place to go. Administered by Alcohol Concern Cymru and supported by Welsh Government, the website provides information about drinks diaries, the calories in alcohol and advice on how to work out how many units an individual consumes. There are links to Welsh Government initiative around alcohol as well as games, interactive quizzes and facts sheets. The link to the website, which is also bi-lingual, is below:

So is this just a Welsh version of DrinkAware?

No. The funding for the Drink Aware website comes from producers of alcoholic drinks, pub operators, supermarkets and off licences. However, and more importantly, the data and statistics used on the website are either English or, at best, British.

Use of the DrinkAware website and it's associated products, for example, education materials, is not recommended.

What about online training for alcohol brief interventions?

Public Health Wales have developed an online training refresher course for those who have already been on the face to face training. Although it covers a great deal of the content of the AGORDED CYMRU and RCN accredited two hour course, the online content cannot match the blended learning of the actual course. Therefore it is not suggested that the Public Health Wales online training is used instead of the face to face training but as a means of 'topping-up' training. Is there any other training available online?

Yes, there is. The Alcohol Learning Centre has online modules for Primary Care, Pharmacy and Hospital settings. Although there is a certificate that can be printed off upon successful completion of the modules, the course is not accredited to any educational awarding body.
