- 1. Why did the British Parliament pass the Act of Union in 1800? To what degree was it flawed from the start?
- 2. How, and why, was the Irish Parliamentary Party (IPP) and Charles Stewart Parnell so successful during the 1880s?
- 3. How, and with what degree of success, did Unionism organise resistance to Home Rule in Britain and Ireland between 1886 and 1914?
- 4. Assess and critically evaluate the impact of the First World War on Ireland.
- 5. How did British Crown forces seek to master the security situation in Ireland after 1919? (You may refer to the films *Michael Collins* (1996) and *The Wind that Shakes the Barley* (2006) and their negative depiction of British Crown forces, if you so desire).
- 6. Why was Éire neutral in the Second World War? How did its policies actually favour the Allies?
- 7. How did the Ulster Unionist Party (UUP) establish its supremacy in Northern Ireland after 1922? How was this supremacy maintained until the late 1960s?



- 8. 'Intelligence was the key to military success in the Anglo-Irish War (Irish War of Independence) and the post-1969 'Troubles'.' Assess and critically evaluate this statement
- 9. How did British counter-terrorist policy evolve in Northern Ireland between 1976 and 1990?
- 10. How were the British and Irish governments able to launch the peace process in the 1990s? How did the process lead to the Good Friday Agreement (GFA) of 1998?
