In 1962 John Garnett was




appointed UK's first lecturer in strategic studies, an important sub-field dealing with the nuclear revolution.

How can I get involved?

Any student can stand for election. There are posts representing: first year students; second year students; third year students; Welsh medium students; joint honours students; and international students. Representatives are in post for **one year** and may stand for re-election.

- The Student Union holds the elections for Staff Student Consultative Committee positions, with the standing open from 25th September to10th October as the deadline for nominations.
- The following week, **voting occurs 16-19 October**. Keep an eye on your email for further information on the elections!
- All new reps will have training organized by the Student's Union.

International Student Exchange

Programme

We run academic exchanges to a wide range of countries, including: Australia, Canada, China, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Poland, Spain and Turkey.

• Interpol students can study abroad for one semester of their second year (a full year on our four year degree schemes).

• A stipend is available to support exchange.

• For those not doing a language-based degree, all tuition is in English.

Who can participate?

• The scheme is open to first year students only and the exchanges take place in year two.

• All Interpol students can apply, including joint and major/minor students.

There are limited places and applicants are selected via a competitive interview process. We are looking for people who have proven that they are enthusiastic about studying international politics, can work hard under pressure, and who are able to adapt quickly to being in a very different environment.

Placement Schemes



Get hands-on experience of political life, assisting political representatives in the House of Commons or the Senedd, the Welsh Parliament.

- Students work in the office of a serving Member of Parliament at the House of Commons (London) or a Member of the Senedd at the Senedd (Cardiff) for between 4 and 6 weeks during the summer.
- The work typically includes writing press releases and dealing with constituency matters, but also includes attending events (sometimes prestigious!). In the past students have even been on the campaign trail!

Who can participate?

 The scheme is open to second year students only and the application process is competitive. Successful applicants are chosen after an interview.
 We are looking for people who are enthusiastic and passionate about politics, who have good interpersonal skills, and who can work hard and diligently under pressure in a non-academic environment



Crisis Game

The Crisis Games are extremely popular activities and this year in Hawkstone Park, Shropshire, 8–10 December. Through these simulations you can learn about aspects of international politics that cannot be taught in lectures and seminars, and build non-academic skills – negotiating, planning, team management, public speaking – which are clearly great assets for future careers...

What is it?

Students are given a crisis 'scenario' and allocated to one of several teams representing national leaders, government departments, transnational corporations, NGOs, international organizations or paramilitary groups, etc. These teams simulate, as realistically as possible, the interactions of the various participants in an international crisis. This 'real time' experience gives students the opportunity to test their abilities to plan strategically, work with others, engage in diplomacy (and, perhaps, a little subterfuge as well!) and put themselves in the shoes of those charged with facing some of international politics' biggest challenges.

Sneha's experience - how did her mentor help?



"My mentor would help me with career options, what Masters degree to do, his wider network influence and helping with dissertation interviewees. He helped me to get in touch with an employer for an interview related to my research and to work on my methodological skills where my degree had not been able to. I realised that my degree wouldn't teach me everything,

the mentoring system helps to plug some of those gaps. Being mentored made me realise what routes of entry there are to career paths in policy. I am now a Research Analyst and my understanding of research and analysis has been shaped by the mentoring system and the help my mentor gave me." Interpol graduate Sneha is now a **research analyst with Defence and Security think tank RUSI** and had a long mentoring relationship both during and after her time at Aberystwyth University.

In Model UN we give you the opportunity to debate the issues affecting our world in a wide range of simulations using an ACMUN specific format of the United Nations. Participants often have to take uncomfortable positions and

defend their chosen countries' records on a wide range of topics. Everyone will attempt to put forward resolutions that either benefit them or veto proposals that hurt participants and/or their interests. You don't need to have any previous knowledge of the topic to participate as long as you look up your country's involvement on the issue at hand. Previous Model UN events have included "Refugee crisis" held by the UNHRC, "Scar on Myanmar" held by Asean. We also hold meetings from the past such as the "Yalta Conference" and the "Congress of Vienna".



Crisis Events

Modelled on the highly successful department games, Crisis Games are a dynamic and complex geopolitical simulation of potential and past crises. Last year, these have included events such as the "Franco-Prussian

War" and "1956 Suez Crisis". Teamwork, complex problems, backroom deals and the application of creative solutions is what makes Crisis Games unique and thrilling. 
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
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Interstate
