## **Guidelines for Part One Registration**

#### How many credits do I need to take?

Students should take **120 credits** in each year of their degree scheme.

#### How many credits is each module worth?

All of the first year modules in the **Department of International Politics are worth 20 credits** each.

The number of credits a module is worth is shown by the last two digits in its Module ID. The first two letters denote the 'home' Department e.g.

IP12420 – 20 credit module in the Department of International Politics

#### English/Welsh

The Department of International Politics offers opportunities for its undergraduate students to study through the medium of both English and Welsh.

Modules offered by the Department begin with 'IP/IQ' if they are taught in English or 'GW/GQ' if they are taught, either partially or wholly, through the medium of Welsh.

Most GW modules at Part One are taught partially through the medium of Welsh – i.e. English lectures (or a proportion of the lectures in Welsh on GW12420) and Welsh seminars/workshops.

One GW module at Part One is offered wholly through the medium of Welsh (lectures, seminars and workshops) – **GW12920 Gwleidyddiaeth yn yr Unfed Ganrif ar Hugain**.

Students can opt for the GW version of modules every time if they wish, or they can chose to take just one or two GW modules, while studying the rest of their modules in English.

All students, on any module in the Department, regardless of the medium of teaching, have the choice to submit coursework and sit examinations in either English or Welsh.

### Which modules should I take?

Most of our **single honours** students take **all their modules** from within the Department. Single honours students must take **100 credits**' worth of 'GW' or 'IP' modules, and joint honours students must take **60 credits**' worth of 'GW' or 'IP' modules.

The detailed requirements for single honours, joint and major/minor degree schemes are shown at the end of this booklet.

You may wish to take some **modules outside the Department** in order to make up your 120 credits; joint and major/minor students must do so.

#### When you are deciding on your modules, remember:

Check **which semester** modules are running in and do not load your modules unevenly; we strongly recommend that you have an **even balance** of 60 credits in each semester.

If you **mix modules** from different departments, check on the **timetable** that the teaching doesn't clash!

You can **change modules** after the module has started. Ideally, if you wish to change modules you should do so in the first two weeks of teaching via your student record.

#### **Brief Description**

This module will provide a thorough and wide-ranging introduction to central concepts and themes in the study of international politics. It will outline a series of key theoretical positions and will encourage students to analyse and evaluate them with reference to a mixture of historical and contemporary examples.

#### **Brief Description**

This module provides an opportunity to reflect critically upon developments in international politics in real time. The curriculum is unique because it is necessarily determined by political domestic and world events as reported in the media. The focus is on news and opinions that appear from week to week during the course of the semester, and students develop their skills as researchers, critical thinkers, presenters and writers while becoming more media-aware. Lectures demonstrate the ways in which a variety of academic researchers and public intellectuals respond to world events, and in-depth seminars and other formats support the development of skills to be assessed in the module and provide students with crucial employability skills (e.g. writing of media opinion articles, policy briefing papers).

#### Content

This module introduces to the teaching programme of the Department a real-time experience of the relationship between world events, media reporting, and the academic study of international politics. The module draws on a variety of perspectives from within and beyond the Department of International Politics, as unfolding media content is critically assessed by different contributors. Lectures demonstrate the ways in which a variety of academic researchers and public

intellectuals respond to world events, and in-depth workshops support the development of skills to be assessed in the module. Learning activities in seminars and practicals, are designed to encourage students' intellectual autonomy, succinct writing, and logical argument, and to provide them with basic employability skills on which they can build throughout their studies.

#### **Brief Description**

The module introduces first year undergraduate students to 'big' issues, trends and debates in global politics in a way that lays intellectual foundations for Honours-level study of military and international history. Students will be provided with a grounding in subject-specific knowledge and techniques which will contribute to the general development of scholarly and employability skills.

#### Content

The module explores broad trends and patterns in 18th, 19th and 20th century international relations. The lecture programme is divided into four thematic sections. The first looks at general trends, historiographical developments, and modes of analysis pertinent to the historical discipline. The second explores different manifestations of military, political, technological and economic power and the evolving nature of the international balance of power. A third section explores revolution and conflict in the non-western world and a final section looks at how revolutionary, reformist and reactionary ideologies have impacted upon ideas about the management of international society and the pursuit of peace.

#### **Brief Description**

The module introduces first year undergraduate students to the key ideas and debates in the fields of war, strategy, security and intelligence. In this way it provides the intellectual foundations for Honours-level study in these fields as well as a grasp of key ideas and concepts for those studying in other areas of International Politics and related fields. Students will be provided with a grounding in subject-specific knowledge and techniques which will contribute to the general development of scholarly and employability skills.

#### Content

The module explores key ideas and debates in the study of war, strategy, intelligence and security. The lecture programme is divided into four thematic sections:

- 1. The study, nature and limits of war.
- 2. Strategy, including conventional strategies, deterrence, revolutionary-guerrilla warfare and terrorism.
- 3. The study and practice of intelligence.
- 4. Contemporary security problems and debates.

There will be a particular emphasis on non-Western approaches to International Politics and the challenges of global development.

#### **Brief Description**

This module seeks to introduce students to some of the key concepts, ideas, institutions and actors approaches in the study of politics. It aims to examine key changes in the nature and practice of politics, in order to better understand the main opportunities and challenges of politics in the 21st century. We will explore a range of different approaches, systems and issues in contemporary politics, drawing on examples from across the world. The module will give students an opportunity to engage with classic works as well as contemporary debates regarding the nature of politics. It seeks to strengthen student awareness of the range of types of political systems and institutions, forms of political engagement as well as some of the key ideas that shape contemporary political debates.
