



## **Internship opportunities at the David Davies Memorial Institute**

The David Davies Memorial Institute (DDMI) seeks to appoint up to five interns for the academic year 2020-21. Throughout the year the prospective interns will be expected to help with the running of the DDMI's core activities. These include, but are not limited to, organization of lectures, talks, workshops and other events hosted by the DDMI; maintenance of the DDMI's website and Twitter account; editorial assistance with various materials published by the DDMI; research assistance with the DDMI's current projects. Successful applicants will be expected to actively contribute to at least one of these areas.

The positions will commence in October 2020 and last until June 2021. The expected commitment is about 10 hours/month. The positions will come with a modest stipend of £500 (paid in two instalments in January and May). The funding is generously provided by the Gwendoline and Margaret Davies Charity, which supports the work of the DDMI.

Applicants must be second or third year undergraduate students or MA students in the Department of International Politics.
