Without Author's Rights Retention

- Authors will have ownership assigned to them by the University of their Scholarly Works¹.
- On acceptance for publication, publishers request assignment of the copyright ownership of the Scholarly Works to themselves.
- ➤ When the Scholarly Works have been deposited in the University's digital repository in the format of a post-print/Author Accepted Manuscript (AAM)², the University are bound to adhere to any embargo periods and license terms stipulated by the publisher prior to making it publicly available via the AU Research Portal.
- Permission needs to be sought from the publisher by anyone including the authors themselves - for the use of those Scholarly Works in teaching or for sharing in AAM form, prior to the end of any embargo period.
- Publishers are able to reuse the content assigned to them from those Scholarly Works as they see fit.
- Publishers are able to assign and pass on the copyright of those Scholarly Works to third parties as they see fit.

With Authors' Rights Retention

- Authors will have ownership assigned to them by the University of their Scholarly Works.
- Authors shall grant the University a non-exclusive, irrevocable, worldwide licence (the "University OA Licence") to make their Scholarly Works, publicly available in the University's digital repository, in the format of a post-print/Author Accepted Manuscript, and under the terms of a Creative Commons Attribution (CC BY), or comparable licence.
- The University is not bound to adhere to any embargo periods once the Scholarly Works have been deposited in the University's digital repository.
- Anyone including the authors themselves can use those Scholarly Works in teaching or for sharing in AAM form according to the CC BY licence, at any point from publication acceptance.
- The University asserts the author's right to retain copyright, and the University OA Licence is binding on any successors in title to the Scholarly Works, and any assignment of the Scholarly Works to a publisher are granted subject always to the University OA Licence.
