1. How is climate change likely to affect different parts of the world and how might states take the lead in ameliorating these challenges?
2. With reference to examples, identify ways in which migration is driven by economic, cultural and political processes.
3. How might the use of smart technologies (e.g. smartphones, wearable technologies, biometrics etc) be changing what it means to be a citizen?
4. Why might 'quality of life' measures be more important in understanding development than income?
5. In what ways is plastic waste in our food chains a problem for human geographers to explore and address?
6. "Globalization is shaping the city more than the countryside". Do you agree with this statement?
7. Do maps provide an 'objective' view of the world, or are they always influenced by politics and the people that create them?
8. How has the internet transformed our experience of place and space?
9. "The United Kingdom is more disunited that it has ever been". Discuss why this might be the case from a geographical perspective.
10. To what extent is the idea of place still significant in relation to identity?
