Our Creative Writing course provides exciting and diverse opportunities for working in a broad variety of forms and genres. At Aberystwyth you will develop confident, imaginative and inventive creative skills through engaging with a broad curriculum that cuts across traditional subject boundaries.

Over the duration of your course, you will explore and experiment with genre, form, language, media, style, and presentation. We will encourage you to experiment with writing in a wide range of styles and give you the chance to encounter and practice writing for an array of different purposes.

Studying Creative Writing at Aberystwyth University will enable you to write with confidence, tailoring your work to different audiences and agendas preparing you for whatever career path you choose to take in a whole host of professions for which powerful, compelling communication matters. You will have an acute awareness of issues such as tone, structure, genre and function and how to effectively utilise these in your own writing.

Creative Writing

BA (Hons)

Our Creative Writing course provides exciting and diverse opportunities for working in a broad variety of forms and genres. At Aberystwyth, you will develop imaginative and inventive creative skills that will enable you to work confidently and effectively in a wide range of styles, preparing you for your professional career.


This degree offers a broad curriculum that cuts across traditional subject boundaries. Over the duration of this course you will explore and experiment with genre, form, language, media, style, and presentation.

Upon completion of this degree, you will be able to write with confidence, tailoring your work to a broad range of audiences. You will have a highly developed awareness of issues such as tone, structure, genre and function, and of how to utilise these effectively in your own writing.

- the benefits of working in an inter-disciplinary environment that allows you to explore your creativity across a range of academic subjects

Modules

First year:

You are introduced to a range of writing styles and genres through our core modules - creative practice and writing short stories. Creative practice is designed to provide a foundation of essential knowledge and techniques. Writing short stories hones these skills for short-form prose. You can choose option modules from a wide range of courses looking at literature from the classical era through to contemporary writing, explore creative-critical responses (where you choose whether to write a critical or a creative piece for your assessment), and develop your poetic skills or your knowledge of global literature.

Second and third years:

You will explore a wide range of types of writing to produce and present your own writing professionally and reflect on your own creative practice. We offer modules on writing genre fiction, such as graphic novels and crime fiction, on writing poetry, and on specific skills such as plot and characterisation. In parallel to this, we offer modules designed to introduce you to the best and the most exciting writing from the last 1000 years, from medieval texts through to contemporary fiction. Texts across the genres of prose, drama and poetry, texts that deal with personal, political and philosophical concerns that affect us all. Your final year project allows you to explore any creative mode and topic, and you will have the opportunity to take part in our annual writing retreat designed to kick-start your preparation for this creative endeavour.





English Literature

BA (Hons)

Our English Literature degree will fire your imagination by exploring the widest possible range of literary texts and cultures. We offer our students a superb choice of courses from the early medieval period to the present day.


You will discover a wide variety of approaches to literature and culture. Our course encourages you to read widely and to think critically about writing and its contexts, and the philosophical and political trends that shape the ways we read and write.

Upon completion of this course, you will have outstanding powers of expression and communication, augmented with specialist knowledge and research skills. You will discover your potential as an independent learner, whilst working within a nurturing and structured learning environment that will enable you to excel.

A degree in English Literature at Aberystwyth offers you:

- the opportunity to learn alongside researchers who are recognised internationally for their contributions to knowledge and the furthering of the discipline
- a strong tradition of specialist teaching in the fields of women's writing, writing and place, children's literature, Welsh writing in English, LGBTQ+ writing, Postcolonial literature, Medieval studies and Romanticism amongst many more
- opportunities to work with leading literary and cultural institutions such as New Welsh Review - Wales' foremost literary magazine - and Aberystwyth Arts Centre - which is one of the largest arts centres in Wales, recognised as a 'national flagship for the arts.

Modules

First year:

Your first core module, critical practice, will provide you with the necessary foundation for successful engagement with literature at university level. The module builds upon your existing skills and helps you become an independent thinker and critic. You will also study writing from the pre-1800 period, introducing you to the long tradition of English literatures from Chaucer to Defoe. In addition, you will choose from an exciting range of option modules, including literature and the sea and introduction to poetry, that allow to respond to what you are learning either creatively, through your own writing, or critically, through essays. You will also be able to study writing from an exceptionally broad range of places and periods, such as Greek and Roman Epic and Drama, American literature and contemporary writing.

Second and third years:

In your second year, modules with a historical sweep, such as medieval texts and their world, nineteenthcentury literature, and literature since 1945, will deepen your understanding of literatures in English from the last 1000 years. You will choose specialist options from subjects including the graphic novel, contemporary politics, genre fiction, gender and sexuality, or writing about place. Alongside this, you will engage with the philosophy and politics of reading in literary theory: debates and dialogues. In your third year, you will again select from specialist modules that allow to develop your own interests including romantic eroticism, the eighteenthcentury novel, postcolonial writing and ghost stories. The dissertation will allow you to develop your own research project which includes our annual writing retreat.

English Literature and Creative Writing

BA (Hons)

Our combined course in English Literature and Creative Writing will enable you to develop as both a creative and critical practitioner. This degree will expand your range and capabilities as a writer and enable you to work with confidence in a variety of genres and forms.

You will develop a reflective writing practice informed by a wide-ranging knowledge of writing from the past and present, an understanding of the cultural and intellectual contexts in which literature is written and read, and an awareness of the range and variety of approaches to literary study and the practice of writing.

A degree in English Literature and Creative Writing at Aberystwyth offers you:

- · the opportunity to learn alongside a team of distinguished, awardwinning authors who work across a broad spectrum of creative fields
- a strong tradition of specialist teaching in the fields of women's writing, writing and place, children's literature, Victorian writing, Welsh writing in English, LGBTQ+ writing, Postcolonial literature, Renaissance drama and Romanticism, combined with opportunities to develop your writing with practitioners who have expertise in a diverse range of genres such as contemporary poetry, the graphic novel, crime fiction, life writing, historical fiction, science fiction, and writing for stage, screen, and radio
- the benefits of a combined discipline that allows you to explore the creative/critical intersection and to develop into a creative professional with the underpinnings of a traditional academic discipline.

Modules

First year:

Your first core modules, critical practice and creative practice, will provide you with the necessary foundation for successful engagement with literature and creative writing at university level. Critical practice builds upon your existing skills and helps you become an independent thinker and critic; creative practice gives you a foundation of knowledge and techniques for creative writing. You will also study writing from the pre-1800 period, introducing you to the long tradition of English literatures from Chaucer to Defoe. In addition, you will choose from an exciting range of option modules, including Literature and the sea and An introduction to poetry, that allows you to respond to what you are learning either creatively, through your own writing, or critically, through essays. You will also be able to study writing from an exceptionally broad range of places and periods, such as Greek and Roman epic and drama, American literature and contemporary writing.

Second and third years:

You will explore a wide range of writing modes, produce and present your writing professionally, and reflect on your writing practice. Our writing modules cover graphic novels, crime fiction, specific skills (plot, characterisation), and much more.]Our English modules introduce you to the best, most exciting literature from the last 1000 years, from medieval texts to the newly published. You will choose from a range of specialist modules that allow you to explore the subjects that fascinate you (such as the ghost story, postcolonial writing, writing about gender and sexuality in different periods, and Victorian writing), and develop your own creative writing or English research project, with the opportunity to go on our annual writing retreat.

English Studies and Climate Change

BA (Hons)

Our combined course provides a thorough and critical understanding of the ideological debates that shape the ways we read and write, challenge our perceptions of the places we read and write about, and interrogate who we are. You will encounter texts that explore and represent climate change, that evaluate the climate challenge and its political, economic, social, and ecological impacts. By raising provocative questions about human responses to climate change (which invariably involve the written or the spoken word) this course will equip you with the skills and knowledge to analyse diverse perspectives on a global challenge.


This scheme establishes core knowledge of climate science and issues of governance pertaining to climate change alongside subject-specialist engagement with the representation of climate change in literature from the 1800s onwards. In their interdisciplinary learning community students investigate the science of climate change from multiple subject perspectives (Geography, Biology, Politics, and of course Literary analysis).

The English Studies and Climate Change programme provides subject-specialist knowledge of fictional and non-fictional responses to the climate - from Romanticism's accounts of 1816 "the year without a summer" to alternate futures analysis in contemporary speculative fiction. You will develop practical skills in crisis writing across genres and forms whilst also acquiring the subject-specialist knowledge and skills of an English graduate.


Students studying English Studies and Climate Change at Aberystwyth will:

- engage with and develop a distinct multidisciplinary approach to communicating climate change informed by an understanding of the science behind the climate crisis
- analyse the causes and consequence of climate change and environmental degradation, and how literature from the nineteenth century to the present-day comments upon climate change
- examine links between climate change and other global challenges (such as conflict, migration, inequality, and isolationism) and the ways in which these challenges are communicated to diverse audiences
- reflect on ways that the planet's habitats, resources, and ecological systems are reflected in and shape the stories we tell and how such stories challenge the *political* status quo.

Modules

First year:

Your core modules will provide you with the necessary foundation for successful engagement with literature and creative writing at university level. Critical practice builds upon your existing skills and helps you become an independent thinker and critic: creative practice gives you a foundation of knowledge and techniques for creative writing. You will also study writing from the pre-1800 period, introducing you to the long tradition of English literatures from Chaucer to Defoe. You will investigate the science of climate change through two innovative modules, Climate Change: impacts, perceptions, adaptation and The Science of Climate. In addition, you will choose from an exciting range of optional modules, including literature and the sea and introduction to poetry, that allow to respond to what you are learning either creatively, through your own writing, or critically, through essays.

Second and third years:

You will build on your work with staff and students from other disciplines in your core module The Governance of climate change. This module engages students in simulation - presenting you with real-world problems and developing the skills essential to addressing current and future global challenges. You will also take core modules that will give you detailed knowledge of fictional and nonfictional responses to the climate, literature and climate in the nineteenth century, contemporary writing and environmental justice, speculative fiction and the climate crisis and you will develop your own creative writing in whatever genre or form you choose in crisis writing. Our writing modules cover graphic novels, crime fiction, specific skills (plot, characterisation), and much more. Our English modules introduce you to the best, most exciting literature from the last 1000 years. In the final year the creative writing project or english dissertation allow students to synthesise their multidisciplinary and subject-specific knowledge and work with academic supervisors across traditional subject boundaries. With the opportunity to attend our annual writing retreat held at an historic site in the beautiful Mid Wales countryside, the final year project is a fitting culmination to a degree that challenges students to become informed, skilled, and impassioned advocates for change.

Gregynog Writing Retreat and Additional Opportunities

In your final year you will benefit from our fully subsidized annual writing retreat held at a beautiful country manor house in rural west Wales. This immensely popular event allows our students to enjoy some peace away from the hustle and bustle of campus life, whilst developing their final year dissertation and creative writing projects.

As well as the Gregynog Writing Retreat, there are a host of opportunities for engaging with literary culture. Free trips (and free tickets!) to the world-famous Hay Festival are an annual feature of our calendar, and our students have access to subsidised performances at Aberystwyth Art Centre.

Every year our students publish an anthology of their creative and critical work. Aberlnk, which is written, designed and edited by students, showcases not only their writing but also their skills in a broad range of project management activities, including dealing with everything from deadlines to budget control, to promotional events and beyond.





Studying Abroad Opportunities

Research

Studying with English and Creative Writing at Abervstwyth will ensure that you have access to not only the highest quality teaching in our subjects but also to a teaching and learning environment that is driven by world-class research. All our staff are active researchers in their fields and throughout your studies you will be taught by some of the UK's leading scholars in creative writing and literary studies.

Our research forms the basis of our teaching and our research interests are as broad and dynamic as our curriculum. You will be taught by the people who write the books on the subjects you are learning about, by the people who wrote the poetry, novels, short stories, non-fiction, scripts, and graphic novels that you read, and by the scholars who analyse and interrogate such works.

The University's mission is to 'contribute to society in Wales and the wider world by applying our knowledge to local and global challenges'. To achieve this, English and Creative Writing draws upon an extensive network of national and global connections and collaborations, working with academics and creative practitioners from around the world on exciting and innovative projects that our students engage with as part of the process of knowledge creation. Two examples of this vibrant international activity are our research centres, Contempo and The David Jones Centre. ContemPo is a collaborative research centre with a special (but not exclusive) interest in investigating experimental and performance poetries and their poetics. Its core activity is an exciting programme of video-linked papers, seminars, and performances given by poets and scholars of poetry from around the world. The David Jones Centre supports research on the history and impact of modernism in Wales and on the creative interaction of the textual and the visual. The Centre hosts an international conference and seminar series and seeks to promote the exciting possibilities for new research offered by the literary and artistic archives at the National Library of Wales.


